## **NPCC 2025 Test Descriptions**

## SESSION 1 TESTS: 8:45-10:00 (unless noted)

Accounting Test 8:45-10:00 Room 131

- 1. No limit on participants per school
- 2. Grade levels: 11<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> graders who have had or are currently taking accounting
- 3. Students should bring calculators

The multiple-choice exam covers the steps of the accounting cycle. Topics include journalizing, posting, preparing a trial balance and financial statements, adjusting accounts, recording closing entries, and using special journals to record transactions for a merchandising business.

#### **Biological Science**

8:45-10:00

**HASC Room 203, 204, 206** 

- 1. Two students per school
- 2. Grade levels: 10<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> graders who have had or are currently enrolled in Biology
- 3. Testing format: Multiple Choice

Students planning to take the Biological Sciences exam should expect a multiple-choice exam covering the basic concepts of Biology. A successful student in this exam would have a strong desire to pursue a career in biology related fields: i.e. medicine, nursing, bio-technology, laboratory technology, agricultural sciences and dental technology and have at least one year of HS Biology.

<u>Chemistry</u> 8:45-10:00 HASC Room 202

- 1. One student per school (space will be limited to the first 24 registrants)
- 2. Grade levels: 11<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> graders who have had or are currently enrolled in chemistry
- 3. Testing format: Multiple Choice & demonstration
- 4. Students will need to bring a scientific calculator (graphing calculators are not allowed).

Students planning to take the Chemistry exam should expect a multiple-choice exam covering the basic concepts of Chemistry. A successful student in this exam would have a strong desire to pursue a career in chemistry related fields. In addition to the test there will be a few demonstrations performed for students.

#### **Dramatic Arts / Theater**

8:45-10:00

Theater

- 1. Limit of two students per school
- 2. Grade levels: 9<sup>th</sup>-10<sup>th</sup>
- 3. Students should bring prepared dramatic work 3-5 minutes in length

Students planning to participate in the Dramatic Arts Competition must be prepared to present a 3-5 minute dramatic work for an audience (performers will be stopped at the five minute mark of the presentation). The presentation can be a monologue from a dramatic work, a cutting from a literature piece, or works of poetry (<u>a</u> <u>monologue is preferred!</u>). This presentation must be a solo performance that <u>must</u> be memorized. The dramatic presentation will be judged by a panel led by NPCC Theatre instructor Ritch Galvan. Judges will be evaluating; Character, Voice, and Movement. Awards will be given to top three performers.

Graphic Design 8:45-10:00 Room 133

- 1. One student per school (limited to 10 testers, the first 10 entries will be given priority)
- 2. Grade levels: 11th 12th
- 3. The test will include three parts: a quiz, a computer exercise, and a logo sketch

Students taking the Graphic Design exam would benefit from some design background. A student can expect success in this exam if they enjoy working on the computer, have great ideas, and a good eye for detail.

- 1. Two students per school
- 2. Grade levels: 11<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> graders considering a career in health occupations
- 3. Testing format: Multiple Choice
- 4. Presentation: Career exploration of health related careers including Emergency Medical Services, Dental Assisting, Medical Laboratory Technician, and Nursing

- 2. Grade levels: 11<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> graders with computer knowledge or interest in a career in Information Technology or related fields
- 3. Testing format: Multiple Choice, True/False, Matching

The Information Technology exam will cover basic concepts of computer hardware, operating systems, networking, and security. Students will be successful if they are computer savvy and have a strong desire to engage in computer related activities.

Mathematics 8:45-10:00 HASC Room 125, 126

- 1. Two students per school
- 2. Grade levels: Preference should be given to Seniors that are currently enrolled in College Algebra, Trigonometry, or Pre-Calculus
- 3. Testing format: Multiple Choice and brief presentation

Permitted calculators for the ACT or other standardized exams are allowed; however, smart phones or other digital devices are not allowed.

- 1. Grade levels: 10<sup>th</sup> -12<sup>th</sup> graders who plan to attend NPCC or have yet to decide on a post-high school institution

- 1. No limit on testers Students testing Sociology in McCook cannot register to test for Sociology in North Platte
- 2. Grade levels: 9<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup>
- 3. Testing format: Interactive lecture followed by a multiple-choice test

Students who have an interest in the behavior sciences and may be interested in career fields such as social work, law, healthcare, justice, early childhood development, or counseling. Sociological concepts can be applied in any career field. Students should expect 20-30 minutes of interactive lecture covering the topics of culture and socialization followed by a multiple-choice test over the information presented and general sociological concepts. Students who are attentive and are able to follow the lecture will do well.

#### **Business Communications**

- 2. Grade levels: 10<sup>th</sup> -12<sup>th</sup> graders who have had business courses or are currently interested in business
- 3. Testing format: Multiple Choice

The multiple-choice exam covers the basic styles of communication in the business world including written and verbal communication, social networking, intercultural and global communication, ethics, etc.

- 2. Grade levels: 11<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> graders who have had or are currently enrolled in chemistry
- 3. Testing format: Multiple Choice & demonstration

This test will cover economics, business ownership, international business, social responsibility, management, marketing, finance, information systems, business law, personnel, production, and business organization.

- 1. Limit to the first 18 students
- 2. Grade levels: 11<sup>th</sup> -12<sup>th</sup>
- 3. Testing format: Multiple Choice

Students taking this exam should expect a multiple-choice exam covering medical terms relating to the entire body system.

#### **Music Theory & Ear Training**

- 1. Grade levels: 10<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup>
- 2. Testing format: theory and ear training test 🎜 💧

- 2. Grade levels: 11<sup>th</sup> -12<sup>th</sup> graders who have had or are currently taking Personal Finance
- 3. Students should bring calculators

The Personal Finance test covers a variety of personal finance topics, including, but not limited to: money management strategies, responsible use of credit, home buying, taxes, budgeting, insurance and investing.

Poetry Writing 10:10-11:25 Room 136

- 1. Limit to first 30 students
- 2. Grade levels: 9<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup>
- 3. Testing format: Creative Writing Competition

Students will be given a prompt during the session and will have time to write a short piece.

# EXTENDED SESSIONS: TESTERS SHOULD NOT REGISTER FOR OTHER TESTS.

Art 8:45-11:30 Room 135, 137

- 1. Two students per school. Students should not register for other exams
- 2. Grade levels: 11<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> graders with at least two years of high school art or a strong desire in pursuing a career in an art related field
- 3. Part 1: Test covering terms and concepts used in the field of visual communications Part 2: Performance (drawing) test
- 4. Students should bring a minimum of two pencils and erasers

Students planning to pursue the visual arts should sign up for this test and performance. The test will encompass terms and concepts used in the field of visual communication. A second assessment will be conducted in the manner of performance (drawing) test.

**Criminal Justice 8:45 – 11:25 Room 122/124** 

- 1. Three students per school limited to first 24 students
- 2. Grade levels: 9<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup>
- 3. Testing format: Hands-on interactive crime scene investigation, interactive lecture on criminal justice fundamentals and career possibilities, examination and discussion

Open to students who have an interest in criminology or the criminal justice field. Future careers may include police officer, sheriff, secret service, lawyer, probation officer, border control agent, U.S. Marshal, victims advocate, correctional officer, fire investigator, court clerk, etc. Students should expect to split their time between a hands-on crime scene investigation, an interactive lecture and examination focusing on fundamental concepts within the criminal justice field as well as exploration of career possibilities. The morning will conclude with an interactive discussion with MPCC criminal justice instructors where students can ask questions and debrief from the morning's events. Winners will be selected based on results from the examination and the accuracy of their crime scene investigation. The material presented will include mock crime scenes and may include depictions of blood, but no injured persons. Students who may be uncomfortable with photos or depictions of crime scenes should avoid this session.
